Between Us . . .



What are you reading this summer, if anything? (I once had a colleague who regularly published his current and ongoing reading list – it always made me feel inadequate!) I ask because leisurely reading is one of my images of summer. I remember being ten,

escaping the heat and humidity of a St. Louis July by retreating to the one room in our house that had an air conditioner, with my new stack of library books. Even now, decades later, I have vivid images of the world of Mrs. Piggle-Wiggle.

Sometimes I long for the world of those memories. I imagine my ten-year-old self unburdened by responsibility and worries. But that's not quite true, certainly, even at ten, my life was challenged by realities I was well aware of. Perhaps I simply yearn for more un-burdened moments now, and so I let myself drift into imagination and memories. Which usually brings me back again to the work at hand, for my life anyway, which is to discover and practice the ability to be unburdened by the realities I live with now, no matter what form they are taking. This is the edge of my own religious learning and growth: to accept the way things truly are, even what makes me afraid, while loving this world enough to work for it **AND** be joyful.

Which brings me back to reading, realizing that my list covers a wide range of aspirations: a collection by Bill McKibben, a tome titled Ecopsychology, memoirs of a food writer and perhaps my first science-fiction novel are in my stack this week, along with ever-present poetry. What's in yours?

I have a few updates on various moves, beginning with office changes at the Fellowship. This moving continues at a gentle but steady pace. Michael Molk is absorbing children's RE library books into his office. My "old" office is slowly becoming the new library and is still usable for small meetings. Ann Mbacke and David Servias are half-moved into the old library (that particular room is no longer available for meetings.) My new office (formerly Niyas's) is nearly finished being painted, and will receive books and furniture mid-month. David's old office off the Social Hall will become "File Central," accommodating files which are now scattered throughout the building. Thanks so much for your patience as we make these changes! The results will include more general meeting space (a bigger library) and easier coordination for staff.

Our move to Oregon is about to be complete. On August 4 I'll go to Michigan with my son Calvin who has been here with us for three weeks. He will soon get started as a freshman at Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, so we need to be there for orientation. (Then I'll take a three day break to attend a yoga retreat.) I'll also be cleaning the furniture out of our Kalamazoo house so that the buyers can move in. With the help of Calvin and other son Ian we'll load a U-Haul, then Ian and I will head west, hoping to make it back here in a three to four day drive, around August 16. I'll be very glad to be starting our second year of shared ministry at the UUFC, building on the beautiful connections and directions we've started in the first. I want to thank you for your parts of this great start as well – I am grateful every day.


Justice Work Discussions

Take a Moment to Appreciate the First Harvest

The Wheel of the Year Fire Circle gathering scheduled for August 1st has been canceled to give those that do the organizing a break.

The Wheel of the Year group at the Fellowship organizes gatherings to celebrate eight special points in the Earth's annual dance around the sun. Besides the two solstices and two equinoxes, we celebrate the four cross quarter days half-way in between. In ancient times the cross-quarter days were the beginnings and endings of the traditional seasons that were based on the light of the sun. For example, May Day or Beltane is the beginning of the three months of greatest daylight ending in early August with the cross-quarter day known in some ancient traditions as Lughnasadh or Lammas. Although we are taking a break and not having a formal gathering for this early August cross-quarter day, we invite you to take a moment to honor this time of year.

"As August begins we are the midpoint of the warm half of the year that began at Beltane on May 1 and will end with Samhain on November 1. This cross-quarter day, the first of three harvest festivals, marks in some climates the first cut of grain and the baking of bread from that new grain. Wherever in the northern hemisphere we live, whether our fields are ripe with wheat or corn, barley or oats, rye or rice, let us be mindful of the many hands and hearts that bring the bread to our tables." from Patricia Montley's **In Nature's Honor**.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)—Appeal for Detroit

UU's and UUSC members have long held that clean water is a basic right of individuals. When I get up in the morning I have water to make the coffee I so enjoy before indulging in a nice long shower. I cherish both these morning rituals and am grateful.

A few days ago as a member of the UU Service Committee I received an alert from them about **the mass water shutoffs in Detroit, Michigan.** The Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) had begun disconnecting water from households that were unable to pay their water bills. In May, the DWSD served 46,000 shutoff notices and executed over 4,000, all in the poorest, hardest hit communities in the bankrupt city. Growing up poor in Newark, NJ, our water was shut off twice so the above notice deeply affected me.
