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Weekly Sunday Offering Resumes

Starting this week, we'll gather an offering for a local need, of which there are plenty. This week, at the request of our Food and Housing for All team, support will be given for the building of micro-shelters (safe sleeping pods) for homeless people – possibly for the most vulnerable, who have medical conditions. Several of these shelters are already built (by volunteers); each one costs about \$3K for materials. The SafePlaces organization hopes to raise \$15K by early April. Your contributions are welcomed. Next week, we'll send support to the Corvallis School district for their project of maintaining weekly food support for families who depend on school breakfasts, lunches and weekend supplies

Where We Are This Week

Dear all – We are just beginning to settle in. This is no longer novel, and it's beginning to feel scarier, at least to me.

Some folks may have imagined a few days – perhaps that was all they could imagine – and now they're ready to get up and go. But just now it's the time to stay, stay put, stay calm, and lean into it. We all need practice for this, and practice takes motivation. The biggest motivator must to be love and compassion, for everyone, and for the fabric of community life – here and everywhere else. This is truly a challenge in this country where we have become experts as taking care of mostly ourselves. We are being challenged to live into new ways of thinking.

Like others, I worry about "the economy." I'm not an economist, but I know that there is no such thing as the economy which isn't the sum total of the relations between all people in the whole world, and even more between all people and the whole living earth. Yes, this is a disruption. The worst kind of disruption. It comes at the cost of too many lives. May we imagine that perhaps it will eventually provide opportunities to change and improve the relations which make up the economy -- opportunities for more equity and justice, and the sustaining of life.

I'm worrying about the small economy which is the Fellowship. Things will change for us as they have during other times of hardship. We will adjust as needed, maintaining our priorities to supporting our staff and taking care of our facilities. The leaders of the stewardship and finance teams have agreed that we will do our annual pledge drive as planned, in April. We know that finances have changed, and will change, for some of us. But we will go ahead, to see where we are and how the support of the Fellowship can be maintained.

Our focus this year has been on ethical living. Stewardship of our congregational life is an ethical obligation, a responsibility of being a member of the Fellowship which comes more clearly into focus in hard times. If there

was ever a time to reconsider our obligations, and re-commit ourselves to the covenant which makes us a congregation, this is one of those times.

Thank you for the hard work you are doing, and for staying dedicated to the values we share. The world needs us, and we need each other. I'm sending my love to each of you. Jill
