And because Jill, the staff, the Board, and the Committee on Ministry did such an amazing job of preparation for the sabbatical, nothing has fallen apart! A sabbatical is not only a gift to a minister, it is a gift to a congregation. This sabbatical time is just as much yours as it is Jill's.

As a congregation, your job is to take some time to reflect on some questions: where have we been, where are we, and where do we think we are heading? How shall we live our values in this complex, and hard to keep up with world? What are our responsibilities not only to one another but to the communities beyond the Fellowship? How do we discern what it means to engage in "right action?" How are we accountable to one another and how do set a tone of "right relationship?" And lastly, how to do what is essential in the work of church and what are we passionate about?

Your theme for this year is "Radical Belonging." Not just welcoming folks but how to engender a sense of belonging for newer folks and folks who have been around for a long time. How does everyone move from visitor or new member or the periphery to a sense that UUFC is their community where they belong? It is a human need to belong, to feel valued, included, heard, supported.

In UUism right now, the focus is on formerly marginalized persons. In particular, Persons of Color and Indigenous folks. Persons with disabilities. And on transgender, non-binary, and queer identifying people. This is not to say that other marginalized identities' voices do not matter. It is simply that these are the groups that currently are facing hatred and violence. These are voices which when heard, expand our understanding of what it means to be human beings and what a current need is in terms of justice work.

The Rev. Hector Lopez, the first Latino Conference minister to be called to serve a UCC conference (translate to District Executive and now Regional Lead), once led a workshop in the 1990's on what we were then calling diversity. Now I think we would call it radical and radical belonging. He said, God keeps sending us people who are "other." People who are in need of a liberal religious community, a place of refuge and affirmation for their identities. He said, congregations keep asking how far do we stretch our arms in this effort. The answer: as wide as they can and then wider.

As you ponder the theme of Radical Belonging, remember that UU's, once did not affirm inclusive language, the ordination of women, or the participation of the Queer community in congregations or pulpits. In the 1970's, a group of women in the Eugene congregation, took it upon themselves to go through each and every hymnal and cross out all language that was not inclusive of women. Thankfully our recent hymnal, Singing the Living Tradition, has addressed that issue. But even that hymnal is not sensitive to racist or ableist language. Those on the margins bring us new awareness's of what it means to do justice. We do not always welcome them or like what they have to say. It makes us uncomfortable or we just want to keep things the way they are. That is the deathnell for any congregation.

Unitarian Universalism is a living tradition. The UUism of 2022 is not the UUism of William Ellery Channing, Emerson or Theodore Parker- the founding fathers of UUism in this country. That train has left the station. Ours is not a static denomination with doctrines and creeds that do not change. Ours is a denomination that realizes as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once said, "God ain't finished with me yet." We are constantly emerging and reemerging. So, I encourage you in this sabbatical time to metaphorically stretch your arms wide and then wider still. This is your time as well as Jill's. Do not squander it.



CLIMATE SOLUTIONS HAPPENINGS: OREGON CLIMATE ACTION PLAN (OCAP)

Yes, Oregon has a climate action plan. Not only that, we're accomplishing those goals! The OCAP Coalition recently released a report celebrating the second year anniversary of the Oregon Climate Action Plan. Oregon made significant progress to reduce climate pollution, address historical environmental injustice, and promote resilient communities and economic vitality across Oregon. If you have in an interest in money management and a willingness to reach out to other members of our Fellowship about topics related to money (pledge drive, long-term giving, estate planning, endowments, etc.), then participation in Finance Council activities may be a fit for you.

Our activities in the past two years have been somewhat in slow motion due to the pandemic. We have provided electronic follow-up support for all recent pledge drives. This involves contacting, via email or phone, members and friends who had made past pledges, but from whom we have not yet heard, to remind them of the current pledge drive. We helped to establish an endowment in memory of Bob Ozretich. The second Ozretich award will be made in May 2022. This endowment supports youth empowerment through provision of funds to support involvement in education, training, and experiential learning opportunities. All of our long-term investments are currently held in the Unitarian Universalist Combined Endowment Fund (UUCEF), but there is interest in exploring opportunities for local investments that may better foster our UUFC aspirations for social and climate justice. Over the past years we have provided short-term, bridge funding for solar power installation projects in Western Oregon. We were successful in obtaining a federal Payroll Protection Program pandemic loan for the UUFC, have submitted a grant proposal to the Oregon Community Foundation, and are exploring other grant opportunities for the Fellowship.

In the coming year we plan to:

- Access our financial council/committee structure and make recommendations for change, if any, to the Board
- Gain additional expertise in using the Breeze software membership management system to enhance its use in pledge drives
- To access our investment holdings in the UUCEF and consider whether there are more satisfying, though possibly less lucrative, possibilities for local or other investment
- To reinvigorate our efforts in encouraging members and friends to consider estate planning and long-term gifts to the UUFC
