- We are interacting with one another and others with respect, honesty, and compassion.
- We are enjoying the beauty of our physical spaces and gardens, which through our generosity and stewardship, have grown to fit our numbers, needs, and resources.
- The local community and the world know and respect us for our work for peace, social and economic justice, and care of the earth.

I wasn't here when this draft was made, but nearly thirteen years later, it seems to me that we have certainly moved in these directions, whether or not we have accomplished all of these ideals. What stands out is this: none of these ideals have happened or will happen without the active participation of the many members and friends of this congregation. This has always been true and will remain true. The Fellowship is us – all of us. As you've heard me say many times, this is not a "spectator sport." We move this month deeper into our theme of commitment. We'll begin a process of renewing our congregational covenant. Whatever it is that you are seeking, it can be found in this work we do together. I hope you'll stay on this journey with us.

UUFC HISTORY

Faith, Hope, and Politics - October 23 - at 1-4 pm in UUFC Sanctuary. Speaker - Ruth Miller. Whatever our political position may be, we're all aware that the system is crumbling around us, and we're all wondering what, if

anything, we can do about it. Dr. Miller will present an historical overview of how the US got where we are today, what our national and local potential futures are, and what we can do – individually and collectively – to make a difference, now.

Have you ever wondered whether we are a Republic or a Democracy and what that means? Or how we seem fixed with a 2-party system? Or what drives a drift towards fascism? This is a chance to find out more. Dr. Miller is the author of over 25 books. CLIMATE JUSTICE VOTER PLEDGE

Surprisingly, most people who say that they prioritize climate don't vote! One of the most important things we can do to address the climate crisis is to elect leaders – from the local to federal levels – who understand the scale of the climate threat and are ready to do something about it. Thus, it is essential that we all vote and make our voices heard!

All Unitarians are encouraged to sign the Climate Justice Voter Pledge. UU the Vote and the Environmental Voter Project are working together to send you reminders to vote before every election. Studies show that these simple reminders can dramatically increase the likelihood of voting.

Our pledge is simple. As a climate justice voter, you commit to:

- •Vote as an act of conscience and care on behalf of the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- •Prioritize voting for candidates and laws that explicitly work to create a sustainable and thriving future for our sacred earth and all life.
- •Vote to protect those who experience disproportionate impacts of climate change.
- •Engage our communities to vote on climate. Connect with the climate justice activists in your life and invite them to join you at the polls.

It's so unfair that his big brothers got to start school weeks before he does. Juan is working in maintenance at Hotel Corvallis and Aracely has worked at Pastini's long enough to qualify for health insurance!

SPONSOR NEEDED

Juan Perla's brother, his wife and 3 year old daughter are in Tijuana, hoping to come to the US. Legally right now MPP protocol and asylum program has been stopped. So no legal crossing for now. In the mean time they will be staying in a shelter in Tijuana and looking for a job. They will fill out the application for asylum so that when the asylum program is reopened they can be called. They will be needing a sponsor as the Perlas did and a lawyer for their case. If you think you may be interested in becoming their sponsor, I would be happy to talk to you about what a rewarding experience it is sponsoring the Perlas. We will also accept donations to help with their expenses.

CHILDREN'S LIBRARY PROJECT

Thanks to a generous gift from an anonymous donor, the RE Council and a special task force have been able to create an updated children's library collection that reflects our community values and is more accessible and easy to use than ever before.

Large orders have been placed from Mahogany Books, a black owned and operated bookstore with a mission to "ensure Black Books were accessible to anyone eager to read about Black culture"; Birchbark Books, which is native owned and operated with "a special emphasis on Indigenous American titles"; and a Kids Company About, which is a small publisher operating out of Portland that focuses on children's books about social issues. The Book Bin is currently working to locate second hand copies of the remaining titles on our list, helping us not only spend local, but go easy on our planet's resources.



As we complete purchasing, our collection is being cataloged into a Libib electronic database. Soon you will be able to sign up and simply scan books with the camera on your phone to check them out. The system is simple and intuitive for users of all ages!

Board Report

NOTES FROM BOARD MEETING, SEPT 20, BY SCOTT BRUSLIND, TREASURER

Attending were Sheryl Stuart, Carl English-Young, Chareane Wimbley Gouveia, Jill McAllister, Jema Patterson (via Zoom), Gavin Araki, Steve Strauss and Scott Bruslind.

With a rather short interval from the 09/11/22 retreat, your Board of Directors and Minister met on Tuesday evening, 09/20/22 in the Social Hall.

We reviewed the proceedings from the retreat. Notable is the attention given to how we covenant with one another on the Board and how that care emanates out through the Councils, Teams and to the members and friends in our congregation.

We were reminded that, as representatives of the congregation, we are in a Shared Ministry with our Minister and the cycle of reflection/evaluation came up. Toward the end of each fiscal year (June), we take stock of our work, the staff, our budget and realign, accordingly. Then, every 3 years, we take time to consider our Ministry- both the work of the Minister and that of the congregation. Our last 3 year review was in 2020, and engendered the congregational survey. A summary of Our Shared Ministry, presented at the 2020-21 annual meeting, is available on the website in the UUFC filing cabinet. We will reprise this review in 2023. https://uucorvallis.org/uufc-filing-cabinet.

There are lots of good things in our filing cabinet, including a copy of Board Policies. In the September Board meeting we spent a goodly amount of time on Policies, we have spent quite a bit of time in past Board meetings on Policies and we are not done.

It's important to consider that, as we streamlined our Bylaws in 2018, we operate through Policies and Procedures. A comprehensive overhaul of our Policies was completed in 2021, and we are well underway in keeping the Policy manual a living document. Fleshing out Procedures remains very much a work in progress. Both are the glue that holds us in all our congregational relationships.

Finally, with regard to relationships, your Board discussed the many benefits that accrue from denominational membership in the Unitarian–Universalist Association. Look for more communication regarding our many–faceted work with other UU congregations and with UUA leadership and staff. We are stronger together.

Our next Board meeting is 10/18/22 at 7pm. As always, guests are welcome and an RSVP is appreciated. Drop a note to the Operations Manager and tell us you are coming and we'll have enough snack.
